Joan Darling has, for several years, participated in numerous juried art shows as well as gallery shows. She studied art at Clark College, Portland State University and the Museum Art School (now Pacific Northwest College of Art) in Portland.

In recent years, Darling has painted at the coast with others in a workshop formed years ago by Nelson Sandgren. She has also attended workshops conducted by both Nelson and Erik Sandgren.

Darling's paintings in this show represent three weeks of painting on the island of Paros, Greece. "It was a challenging experience in that the landscape is so different from Oregon, especially the light. I hope to paint there again," she says. Now that she is retired, Darling is a fulltime artist.

Leland John grew up in Spring-

field, Oregon, and attended the University of Oregon, earning a BA in painting and drawing. He found valuable educational opportunities in museums throughout the United States and Europe, and received his Masters in painting from the University of Iowa in 1967. Before his retirement in 1996, he was an art instructor in several Oregon colleges and universities.

alley Art lost a treasure in Iune when Marial Wilson, a longtime member and origami teacher, died. Born in Newberg, Oregon, she spent her childhood years in Portland, and graduated from Grant High School. Marial went on to attend the University of Oregon as a Fine Arts/Sculpture major, and received her BA in 1942. In 1944 she joined the U.S. Army as an occupational therapist and also used her skills as an arts and crafts specialist. After her discharge, she lived one of the most exciting adventures of her life: For several years she lived in an artists' community in Woodstock, New York. Those were exciting, bohemian years, with memories that sustained her throughout her life. She returned to Portland and became a picture framer at Meier & Frank, and that's where she met her husband. Milton Wilson, an abstract expressionist painter. They married in 1952 and had three children. During this time Marial helped provide for the family and began working at Continued on page 3

"I love the natural world and situations in which humankind and nature have achieved a harmonious balance," John says. "I believe that landscape painters can contribute to this ecologi-

cal balance by constantly and artfully affirming its value and beauty."

Skip Jones finds drawing and painting a challenge. "More so because there is no correct or right answer to the challenge," he says. He finds that addressing the same scene more than once produces different results or answers. What becomes even more interesting for him is to see how others address the same scene. It's their answers that provide him with a rich experience – of

with a rich experience – one that adds immeasurably to his love of life.

Born in Lewiston, Idaho, Gary Meacham attended the University of Oregon from 1957-1963. He moved to Silverton, Oregon, in 1968. Meacham has shown his work at galleries in Silverton and Oregon City.

For several years his travels have taken him to South America where he has done small paintings along the way. Meacham also likes to travel and paint in northern Idaho, where he grew up. He and his wife are planning a sixweek trip to Europe this summer, where he hopes to continues his painting.

After her graduation from the Pacific Northwest School of Art in 1977, Dee Ehlen Vadnais has continued to draw, paint and do printmaking. She attended watercolor workshops taught by Nelson and Erik Sandgren on the Oregon coast, and has traveled to Greece and Mexico to paint. Along with the other artists showing at Valley Art through July and August, Ehlen Vadnais spent three weeks in September 2003 in Athens, Greece, and then in the

Cyclades Islands, principally on Paros. **"One** of my greatest joys as an artist is to paint outdoors in places that I love," says Lucy Warnick. In 1972, while she attended Oregon State University,

she began painting with Nelson Sandgren, who impressed upon her the importance of working directly from nature. She continued to paint in the Northwest and beyond. Recently, she painted with others in Baja, Mexico, and then in Greece.

"During the Greek trip we stayed on the island of Paros and explored beaches such as Kolymbithres. We rode ferries to other islands and to Athens, where we explored the Acropolis and painted it from the roof of our hotel," reported Warnick.

Born in the Chicago area, she studied painting at the University of Illinois, Oregon State and the University of Oregon, where she earned her bachelor's in fine arts in 1974.

Warnick lives in Medford, Oregon, and divides her time between working in her studio and painting on location. She is represented by Rhodes-Stringfellow Gallery in Cannon Beach, Hansen Howard Gallery in Ashland and Hagen Fine Art in Medford.

alert to the trap that its inherent beauty can easily become the theme of the painting at the expense of substance," Walter Weber believes. He goes on to say, "Drawings and paintings should be conceived and executed by dealing directly with the subject matter. This immersion in the situation intensifies the artist's participation in the total environment with the goal of transforming the experience into a metaphoric image."

Thus the experience of actually traveling to Greece and immersing himself in the environment and painting directly from nature.

Weber was raised in Forest Grove and attended school there through two years at Pacific University. He then received BS and B architecture degrees from the University of Oregon.

Following years of private practice in an architectural firm he established in Colorado Springs, Colorado, he joined an international organization involved in building design, construction and maintenance. During this time he lived and worked in Texas, the Far East and Europe.
