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Marcella & Friends: Silverton's Lunaria Gallery comes visiting Reception Wednesday, Aug. 1

Art's contributing calligraphy artist for the past 16 years, introduced many of us to Lunaria Gallery in her hometown of Silverton. Now she and several of its artists will be Valley Art Gallery's "residing artists" during an exhibition throughout July and August.

Marcella is a youthful 83 and a delight to know and work with. Her enthusiasm, sense of fun and delight in life is very contagious. She has an ease with customers at Lunaria Gallery and just generally enjoys people.

Calligraphy and painting have played a major role in her life for more than 40 years. Since she won a penmanship prize in grade school, Marcella's felt like a "woman of the pen" forever. As an adult she studied with master calligrapher Sister Grace Taylor —her friend and contemporary — at Mt. Angel College.

Marcella has taught calligraphy at Chemeketa Community College

and the Silverton Art Center and operated her own gallery. She has been an active member of Lunaria, an artist co-op that opened in 1995. Her husband, Dick, was in the Navy, and also played professional baseball for the Red Sox until he decided five daughters needed to have Dad home more often.

E mily Start has always been an artist. She was the fourth generation of her family to be raised on a farm in the Cascade foothills near Silverton.

"My work has always been a reflection of the natural world around me," she says. The muse on her shoulder, she adds, has dared her to build her own house, work in stained glass and *Continued on page 2*

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open her own bead shop. Now Emily works mainly in sterling silver wire, using gold, copper and brass for accents, along with all kinds of unique stones.

Emily is also a licensed massage therapist and a Reiki 1 and 2 energy worker. Her wish is "for all people to live in the present, embrace the positive, honor beauty and breathe in the abundant life all around us."

nn Altman's goal is "to create art that is a celebration of life and truth."

She attended Massachusetts College of Art in Boston and acquired her bachelor of science degree from Mt. Angel College in Oregon. Ann's paintings are in many private and public collections, and she has done the artwork for book covers, posters and cards.

She has always enjoyed



experimenting with different media, but takes it one step further and makes it her own by recognizing the importance of originality in the process.

Some artists who inspired Ann were Paul Klee, Kandinski, Gaughin and Matisse. She likes to be playful and use lots of color in her artwork. She will

show original artwork and prints at the Valley Art show.

Her grandma's china closet began Teresa Burgett's art career. She gazed inside and saw that "it was filled with exquisitely painted china, made by the hands of Grandma and her friends. Grandma's china ins

Grandma's china inspired my ceramics career," Teresa says.

At 14, her mother taught her to use the woodworking tools in her sign shop in Gig Harbor, Washington. Teresa then went to Burnley, a commercial art school in Seattle. After school she worked for Weyerhaeuser as an artist in Federal Way, where she met her husband Rick. Their son Orion came along and the family moved to Silverton, where Teresa began to do more fine art and show it in the galleries. She and four friends started an artist's cooperative – Lunaria Gallery. Teresa moves from medium to

medium, since she feels art is a process of discovery, technique, ability and sometimes "my true thoughts and feelings."

Shari Lord is a painter and potter. She has work for sale in the Valley Art Gallery and is a member of





ost of her life **Theresa Sharrar** has lived in or near rural countryside in Oregon, Hawaii or British Columbia. The natural elements of those places have influenced and inspired her.

She grew up with lots of sisters, music and art supplies. Her imagination had a chance to really soar, she says, and by age 13 she knew she would spend her life painting.

Theresa says much of her work is "in response to being female and experiencing the wildness of the earth."

Her painting style varies in sub-

ject matter and theme, yet she is "driven by a feeling to find balance and unity in a chaotic world."

ori Webb finds life captivating. She has a fascination for nature, people and places. When she becomes absorbed in something, Lori finds it imperative to "express it with art." Objects dictate her method of conveying them.

"If the subject is full of light," she says, "I may select watercolors for my medium. Rich textures suggest soft pastels. Great depth can best be achieved with oil paints."

Lori finds that artists are observers, and recognizes change is constant. She says many of her pieces are a moment in time; like a memory of the way a place once was. She has always liked variety, so committing to art full-time took a while. Now it has emerged as her truest joy. "I want people to share in my love affair with life," Lori says.

Not unlike other artists, **Tom Allen** is good at making things. By the age of 30 he started his own graphic arts studio in Southern California. A few years later he fell a single tree (!) and built his beautiful home in Silverton, Oregon.

And after dabbling in various art forms for most of his life, it should not be surprising that he created his own art form – sculptural marquetry.

Fascinated by landscapes,

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animals and the human form, Allen sketches continually – recording memories, clarifying ideas and creating designs for future projects.

"That which begins in black and white – the sketch – is transformed by the rich hues of walnut and strawberry tones of bloodwood," he says.
