The new show at Valley Art for July and August features photographers Roy Woo and Mark McDowall and potter Bob Hackney.

For 60 years **Mark McDowall** has called Forest Grove his home. Born at Hillsboro Hospital, he lived in a little house on

His parents took

him to gallery openings and art museums. "I loved to look at the sculpture, dreaming that someday I would have my work in a museum."

He inherited a camera and set out to learn about photography. He loved capturing the beautiful places he discovered. Landscapes are his true passion but he also loves photographing birds. Showing his work at Valley Art is special, too, since his father, and mother, Jo, were both involved with Valley Art.

Roy Woo grew up on a rural farm in eastern Washington. Nature was his "mystical realism." Later in his career as a forester, he was in the thick of the out-

doors and had the opportunity to understand the animals and plants that made up the remarkable natural world.

He discovered photography later in life and "it is this art form that expresses my passion for the wonders of nature. I am always drawn to the delightful movement of light and color over the landscape, especially in sunrises and sunsets. My goal is to create images that are both what the eye sees and what the heart feels."

Bob Hackney, our third featured artist asks, "If you could start your life over at 25, knowing what you know now, would you do it?"

This is what Hackney thinks whenever he enters the studio. In his early 20s, having received his BFA in Ceramics from the University of Wisconsin, he began

a job that took him away from art to be "a responsible adult."

"Foolish mistake," he says. In 2013, an empty-nester at last, he returned to his medium and vocation of choice and now is pedaling as fast as he can to catch up with all those misplaced years.

He says, "Clay for me has always been a

bit of a dichotomy: Am I making functional work or purely art? Is it somewhere between, in the fine craft realm?

"I contend with a myriad of influences, from the most organic of nature to the severest of industrial design and urban decay. Maybe this day I just want to discover the emotional release of sweeping curves that meet on the side of a vase, the bottom of a bowl — or the satisfaction of a well fitted, comfortable and well balanced coffee mug handle.

"Fine Craft and Art is all about the journey — learning from the past, and discovering what's next down the path."

Hackney quotes English designer William Morris: "Have nothing in your house you do not know to be useful, or believe to be beautiful."

His goal, he says, is to create both.

We think you will enjoy the artistic visions of our photographers and potter. All three artists are taking something fundamental — a scene and moment in time,

The goal of Valley Art has always been to pro-


vide an opportunity for artists to sell their work and get a reasonable return. Another goal has been to welcome anyone who wants to learn more about art techniques. Our classroom
