Warm colors are her favorites and she enjoys painting people doing things in their natural surroundings. "I think you learn from failure. 'I'm not doing that again!' We don't like being humiliated,"

And she hasn't always been an artist, but enjoyed art. In California she was the mother of five — and a realtor for 12 years. After her children had all graduated she attended Glendale Community College where she took art classes. She went on trips to Italy and France where she worked in watercolor.

In 1996, two years after a trip to Africa, she had a show at Valley Art based on observations during her safari. It was very well received.

ave Johnson, a lifelong outdoorsman Dand Oregon steeplejack, started blowing glass in the early '70s when he discovered Bill and Sally Worcester's studio in Cannon Beach.

He was so taken by this art that he quit his job, moved to the beach and apprenticed with the Worchesters. In 1987 Dave built his own "hot" studio in Scoggins Valley, northwest of Gaston.

In 1996 he was invited to work as a studio assistant at Penland, a prestigious school of Arts and Crafts in Spruce Pine, NC. He worked there with a number of world-renowned glass artists.

Dave is a part-time resident of Maui and

has worked and shown each vear at Hot Island Glass in Makawoa since 1992.

His glass is inspired by patterns and shapes

Poster artist features black, white, color contrasts

Ruth Hailey, the Forest Grove High School junior who created the 27th annual Chalk Art Festival

poster inside this newsletter, was asked by art instructor Philip Thias to come

up with a design.

She "wanted something that would make a stark color contrast the focus of the piece ... the use of the chalk colors against the black and gray face really struck me.

"I didn't really plan out the design specifically. It was one of those projects that just seemed to flow easily and without any concrete definition.



"The color in contrast to black also brings into focus the depth of the values in the girl's face and hands."

Last year Ruth participated in Chalk Art with her family and a friend. She has lived in Forest Grove seven years and really enjoys working with graphite pencils of various shades. They allow her to create realistic black and white drawings.

Her mentor and greatest inspiration is her artist mother. "She is an iconographer and is extremely talented," Ruth said. "I also use my sisters as models for portraits that I do."

The girl in the poster is based on her own image, she noted. Many thanks to Ruth for this interview.

There will be several events during AAE. We will have artist demos from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Nov. 14, Nov. 15 and Nov. 16.



The auction will end Sept. 23 at 11:11 p.m. That gives more than a month to complete all the stages, including work out the necessary advertising and bidding details.

This stage's event, "Valley Art Call for Auction Items" is the opportunity for participating artists, community members, and businesses to begin adding their donations to the For Sale posts of this group. It's also time to add or invite your friends to the group. The event end time listed is only because Facebook limits any event to no more than two weeks.

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This is not the deadline for bids nor for adding items. Sharing is fine to garner early excitement, early bids, and more donations. Bidding while items are still rolling in is OK.

Volunteers are welcome to procure space and facilitate display of objects for public viewing to bolster bids in the silent online auction, but all bidding will happen in comments to the Sale Posts. Physical viewing of items is not guaranteed.

I have been a participant in several fundraising efforts using art that organize in a few different ways. One method is a very low or no minimum starting bid and letting wonderful pieces go for next to nothing but still raising funds for the cause. Another is a flat starting bid of \$20 and bidding up from there. Another fundraiser for a similar cause was selling donated pieces for about 1/4 of the artist's usual price. Please start bid prices at a reasonable point, we want everything donated to be actually purchased, helping push the Storefront Renovation/Repair fundraising to its goal but we don't want to undervalue anyone's donation.

Payments from the winning bidder will go directly to Valley Art's PayPal account, and applicable shipping payments will go directly to contributors when applicable. Note delivery options carefully before bidding.

Artist Focus Dianne Muhly: Glass Act

Testled in the scenic hills of southwestern Washington County sits the busy studio of one of Valley Art's longtime glass artists Dianne Muhly.

She has been working with glass for nearly 30 years. During 12 of those she's been fusing the glass.

She was approached by Valley Art seven years ago to showcase her finely-crafted decorative - as



well as functional — pieces in its gallery.

I visited Dianne in her studio recently to learn more about how she achieves her brightly colored, multi-layered works of art. Her studio is housed inside a large barn-like building, and her kilns also reside in a separate portion of the airy space.

The walls of her workspace are lined with multiple jars of frit (the colorful



powder that "vitrifies" into glass during the firing process), pliers, glass sheets and tubing of all colors and sizes, glass cutters and myriad other tools ... and **Band-Aids!**

She laid out a current project

for me to see — sheets of glass on which she'll place fanciful flowers and will finish as a paned window. The most time-consuming part of her work is "where to put

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the bones" of a project, and the most joy is experienced when opening that kiln to see the fruition of her time and effort.

When asked about her greatest challenge she answered "staying true to my personal vision" and not succumbing to popular design. I also asked what advice she would give to aspiring glass artists to which she replied "take up knitting."
