Ike Leahy

Ike Leahy feels most camera enthusiasts are capable of becoming good photographers and formal art training isn't always necessary. If they capture images expressing the beauty of life around them and tell a story pictorially, others will respond positively.

Ike considers himself a "pictorialist"– one who tells a story through photographic images, and he's been shooting

nature landscapes for over 30 years. His images are in offices, homes and galleries along the West Coast.

Several Northwest publications have featured his photography on their covers. His diverse background includes being a California police officer, a seasonal park ranger, a headhunter,

The common foundational thread in all of his images is a natural driving energy force that elicits an emotional response. His style is distinguished by intense color and "native" composition.

Ike switched from film to the digital world with a Canon 6D. He uses Fuji Velvia 120 film in a Pentax medium format 6x7. Prints are made by traditional Lambda printing or on an Epson 9800 Pro Fine Art Printer.

Cary Sneider

Cary's lifelong passions include painting, astronomy, and teaching science to kids. Over a long career he's taught science in grades five through graduate school, from Maine to Micronesia.

This includes a decade at Portland State University teaching tomorrow's science teachers. He is now semi-retired and has more time to paint. His painting goal is to capture the feeling of a place so the viewer can "hear" the seagulls and "smell" the ocean.

With the quarantine and abrupt cessation of travel, he's begun a new series of oil paintings inspired by photos taken from airplane windows during cross-country trips. Cary's painting of Portland is based on an image he took as his plane came in for a landing at PDX. Another is based on an image of Mt. Hood and other mountains to the south on an early morning flight to the East Coast. He says, "I never cease to be awed by sunset views of cities, rivers, and mountains from 30,000 feet in the air."

Linda Jerome

Linda Jerome learned to throw pots in high school. She made and sold pottery until she married and family took precedence over art.

Later, she found time to do artwork in watercolor, acrylic, and oil. She took art classes at Portland Community College and went on to get her BFA in drawing, painting and printmaking at Portland State. In 2006 she earned her Masters in teaching at Pacific University. In addition to being a substitute teacher and studio artist at Sequoia Gallery in Hillsboro, she exhibits annually at Sequoia and in shows at other venues, including The Gallery at Ten Oaks in McMinnville.



gets to play. He creates his pottery using several medium-fire clay bodies and explores the qualities of each of them and what they bring to the wheel. He likes forms that challenge his abilities. David

enjoys pottery and intends to focus on form, function, and beauty. He wants to enhance his life, and hopefully give back to the community in a positive way.

When he steps into the pottery studio, it's an escape to the world of creation and wonder. With a form in mind,

the minute he throws a lump of clay onto the wheel, time and the pressures of life disappear. Creative joy — filled with twists and turns — at times take him somewhere he hadn't foreseen.

He enjoys the outdoors, and at home attracts birds to the yard with the water fountains he creates. A natural draw for the many birds that visit, the subtle sound and motion of the water are enjoyable to humans as well. He's been commissioned to make fountains that vary in size and style and has been inspired by the joy that is shared.

Jenny Champlin

I make small batch individual ceramic ware. Using a marble rolling pin, I roll the clay and then press it into a variety of vintage Bavarian cut glass bowls, crystal, and other compelling forms. At times I press old lace and vintage buttons into the clay to add a layer of history and visual texture. Using old movable type, I sometimes add words, quotes, and phrases to the clay.

I don't strive for perfect symmetry. I enjoy implied symmetry, undulating edges, and showing a few slight imperfections. These qualities show that your platter, plate serving dish, bowl or cup is uniquely hand made.

I have 3 colors of glazes, crisp white, rutile-blue* and black stain All ceramic work is microwavable, oven, dishwasher, food safe and ready for everyday use.

3-Day Cold Wax Medium Workshop

with Janet C Hickok.

Sign up for one of the following 3-day workshop dates. Class size is limited to six people; need a minimum of three people. All sessions are from 9:00am-3:00pm, with a break from Noon-1:00pm. Workshop Dates are March 2, 4, 5; March 17, 18, 19; and March 24, 25, 26.

Tuition is \$250 for 15 hours of class time + \$15 class fee (for use of specialized tools/supplies provided by the instructor). This 3-day workshop covers the basics of using cold wax medium in your art practice. This medium, that many contemporary artists are now using, can produce powerful works of art. It allows for incredible depth, texture, color, line-work, multi-media collage, and incorporates many of the styles and techniques used in painting with acrylics and hot wax.

This 3-day class allows for fuller understanding and manipulation within one's own body of work, as well as more complete understanding of the medium and process. Expect to walk away with several small finished pieces or that serve as a base for further exploration.

Signs of life are abundant this month including my favorite return: flowers! As a transplant from the East Coast I am forever enamored with the verdant countryside, the fragrant long spring, and the variety of blooming plants that thrive in this Pacific Northwest climate. It's easy to understand how an artist

could be inspired to create art here. A number of artists who were impressed by


the majesty of the West are well known:

Albert Bierstadt, who traveled the Oregon Trail and painted massive canvases of Western vistas, albeit sometimes romanticized, and Thomas Moran who painted in the Sierras and Rocky Mountains are two. Their art, along with the photos of Carleton Watkins, and of other photographers and painters of the time, piqued the curiosity and wonder of folks back home in the east. National parks owe a large measure of existence to the artists who depicted the wild and beautiful west; these images inspired Lincoln, Grant, and Theodore Roosevelt's campaign to preserve this landscape.

Mt. Hood and Mt. St Helens are frequent sources of inspiration for casual and professional artists in all media. The Portland Art Museum has some stunning examples of such works: Childe Hassam's Mt Hood is a glowing example of his Impressionist painting style. He worked on the east coast as well as in Oregon where he set up an easel at Ecola Beach and the Snake River. And Bierstadt painted Mt. Hood at least 4 times; one of these is in the permanent collection at the museum. Some artists painted strictly outside (en plein air) while others made sketches in the wild and painted mainly in their studios, both resulting in unique visions of their time with nature.

Ready to get out and see the world? Come celebrate spring and see how our artists bring the beauty outside into their work, whether it be clay, paint, or capturing an image on film. We certainly have something at Valley Art to help you bring nature inside and create your room with a view.

Fran in Her Studio

A Love and Passion for Art

Fran Richards

Fran Richards, 88, of Forest Grove, died January 30. She and her husband, Bob, moved to Oregon in

1991 and were longtime members of Valley Art Association.

She showed art regularly at Valley Art for over 26 years and taught classes in pastels and oils. She also maintained a studio at Sequoia Gallery & Studios in Hillsboro, where you could find her working with a colorful tray of pastels. Fran said she liked doing landscapes but really enjoyed painting people doing things in their natural surroundings.

One of her tricks was to use acrylics to instantly put down color, capture what she wanted, because they dry quickly. She put oil paints over that. Warm colors were her favorites, and she joked, "I think you learn from failure. (I'm not doing that again!) We don't like being humiliated."

She loved to travel and shared her drawings and paintings of Africa at a Valley Art show. In 2010, during the annual Sidewalk Chalk Art Festival, she and other artists set up their easels on Main

Street and drew with pastels. Fran's art from that day is in the Forest Grove City Library near the Rogers Room.

In September 2017, Valley Art had a retrospective of her paintings.
